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## What's Cooking in Region 1

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### Mole Negro

12 dry Chilhuacle Negro chiles  
4 dry Mulato chiles  
2 dry Chipotle chiles  
2 tablets "Abuelita" Mexican chocolate  
¼ cup peanuts  
¼ cup sesame seeds  
¼ cup almonds  
4 pitted prunes  
1 stale hard roll  
1 dry corn tortilla  
6 whole cloves  
4 whole black pepper corns  
One 2" piece Mexican canela (soft bark cinnamon)  
1 teaspoon oregano  
1 small bay leaf  
Chicken stock or vegetable broth

1. Remove seeds and veins from chiles. Roast chiles in 350F oven for 10-15 minutes or until dry and crumbly; set aside.
2. In a small sauté pan, toast peanuts, sesame seeds and almonds until sesame seeds are just toasted; set aside.
3. Over open fire on gas range toast tortilla until slightly charred; set aside.
4. In a spice blender/coffee grinder add cloves, pepper corns, cinnamon stick, oregano, and bay leaf and blend until smooth.
5. In a food processor add all ingredients and pulse until mixture resembles a smooth paste, adding stock/broth if needed. This paste keeps well refrigerated or frozen. For sauce, mix 3 cups boiling stock/broth with ½ cup paste.

# Executive Committee Meeting

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**Date:** 19 January 2005

**Present:** Bill Alleman, Darlene Alleman, Bromley Baril, Sue Barnes, John Bauman, John Lewicke, Claire Natola, Tom Shiel, Adam Smargon, Walter Wakefield, Joe Zanca

The meeting was called to order at 8:27 p.m.

Joe Zanca presented Treasurer Darlene Alleman with a check for \$767.00 to establish the Joe Zanca Scholarship Fund. These funds were collected at Boston's Pilgrimage RG. Joe would like the scholarship named for him to be open to everyone, not requiring applicants to be members of Mensa. Joe would also like to not limit the applicants to just New Hampshire and Maine, so as to entice people from all over the country to contribute to it.

Joe spoke to the president of the Mensa Education and Research Foundation (MERF). Two options exist when involving MERF: (1) an endowed scholarship administered by MERF with at least \$20,000 in the coffers to keep it self-sustaining, or (2) a MERF-administered scholarship that hasn't yet reached \$20,000 in funds. With Option 2, the local group sets the ground rules, but MERF does the judging; donations would be made payable to MERF and MERF distributes the funds to the winners.

Joe's ideas for getting the scholarship up to \$20,000 include sending an announcement of the formation of the scholarship to all Editors nationally, and auctioning off a \$5 bill at the Annual Gathering and as many Regional Gatherings as possible.

Joe would like to see the Scholarship begin with the current crop of essays being submitted for our 2005 Scholarship contest. He would like to offer a \$500 scholarship this year from the funds already collected for the Zanca Scholarship, and then send what is leftover to MERF to establish an Option 2 scholarship as outlined above. Then, donors can start sending their gifts directly to MERF, the fund eventually grows to \$20,000, and becomes endowed (Option 1 above).

Darlene agreed to write up the criteria discussed above and re-submit it to the ExComm for approval.

The RG plans are coming along swimmingly with all details falling into place. Darlene offered to Adam Smargon, this year's Games Chair, documentation written by past Games Chair Eric Postpichil for use in planning the Games portion of the RG.

It was decided that the Special Business Meeting set for February 19 solely to discuss the Zanca Scholarship is no longer necessary, so the time slot set aside for that in the RG program will be filled by a presentation or workshop.

Claire presented a Public Relations report on behalf of John Sheehan. As of 14 January, John had submitted publicity about the Regional Gathering and Testing to 12 local media outlets. On 21 January, he was due to blast a press release of same to 225 publications and broadcast media.

John Bauman reported a flurry of inquired in the Hanover area regarding admissions testing. Marty Capodice has agreed to administer a test there in February.

John Bauman reported that National has started a new mini-grant program to support Gifted Children programs.

John Bauman reported that we have a total of 487 members, an increase of 6 over last month. Joe Zanca recommended an aggressive membership recruitment and retention program to consist of sending a postcard as soon as we seem to be losing a member, cross-referencing a list of RG attendees with a renewal list, and making individual phone calls. Joe reminded us that we can request postage funds from our RVC.

Claire Natola moved to adjourn. Bill Alleman seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:53 p.m.

# The Alchemist

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## *Pamplona*

You remember (they show it on TV every year) the running of the wild bulls in Pamplona, Spain. Some of the nuttier people get out their capes and stand in their path as they come roaring down the street.

Our would-be matadors wave their home made cloaks at the bulls hoping the bulls will charge at it and not at them. The list of casualties at the end of the day is sometimes quite large, but, fortunately, not too many are killed.

These two participants, the bull and the make-believe matador, remind me of the those same participants in the stock market. The bull is Mr. Market and the matador is the make-believe investor.

Why do I call him a “make-believe investor”? Because as a former 17-year exchange member, floor trader and brokerage company owner I have had many clients who thought they were “investors”. As a professional I would watch many of the dumb things (like standing in front of a charging bull with a rag in their hand) that clients would do with their money. Many times I could talk them out of it, but others they would insist on being gored.

The professional trader learns very quickly that you cannot stand in front of a charging bull who happens to have the shape of a stock market that is going full speed either up or down. Investors love those upward moves, but a few will say I have a nice profit now so I’ll cash in and take the money only to see their stock, mutual fund or ETF (Exchange Traded Fund) continue its skyward journey.

The problem was they were guessing that their price was at or near the top of the move. Is there any way to know what is the highest price? Actually ‘NO’, but there is a way to catch a very large percentage of the price advance and have Mr. Market tell you when to sell. How? Let me show you the time-honored secret of the long-term professional traders.

Stocks do not make an orderly procession to a top and then turn down in an orderly fashion. They move in stair steps up sometime 2 steps up and one step back or 3 steps up and one step back. Many times they will rest for long periods and consolidate. What you can do is place a stop loss order that should be moved up as your equity advances.

Suppose you bought AT&T at \$50 several years ago and had followed it up with a 10% or 15% stop loss order. It went over \$100 and then started down to below \$15. If you had been following with your stop you would have sold out about \$85 or \$95. The charging bull when it changed direction would not have gored you.

There is nothing to fear as long as you are protecting your investment with stop loss orders. The bull is your friend as long as you have protection when his direction changes.

# Good Wine Cheap

## (and good food to go with it)

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This column is for the reader who has just gotten home from working all day and then has to face preparing dinner for a room full of unappreciative twits (or appreciative ones if you are lucky). The Boss absolutely swears by “Twenty Minute Chicken Dishes” by Karen A. Levin (*published by Contemporary Books*). Every dish (such as the one below) starts with boneless chicken breast and then takes that simple ingredient into many very tasty directions.

The wine this month is a white from the Venetian Region of Northeast Italy. This 2003 Pinot Grigio is produced by Casa Geretto. I usually do not care for low priced Pinot Grigio's. They can be weak and watery or overly acidic. But, this wine is has a very pleasant and distinctive taste of citrus with a hint of peach and melon. This pale crisp wine is a good match for the recipe below. I paid \$8 a bottle for this wine.

### **Tarragon Chicken with Gorgonzola Sauce**

2 whole chicken breasts, split, boned and skinned  
1/2 tsp of salt  
1/4 tsp of ground white pepper  
2 tbsp butter or margarine  
1/3 cup of crumbled Gorgonzola cheese  
1/4 cup of chicken broth  
1/4 cup heavy cream  
1 tbsp minced fresh tarragon *or* 1 tsp dried tarragon

(Other substitutions can be black pepper for the white pepper and 1/4 cup of blue cheese for the 1/3 cup Gorgonzola because of the sharper taste.)

Pound chicken to 1/2 inch thickness. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Heat butter in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Cook chicken in butter until cooked through, about 5 minutes per side. Remove chicken from skillet and reduce heat to medium. Add remaining ingredients to skillet and whisk until thickened and well blended. Return chicken to skillet. Spoon sauce over chicken and heat through. Serve with pasta or rice. Makes 4 servings.
