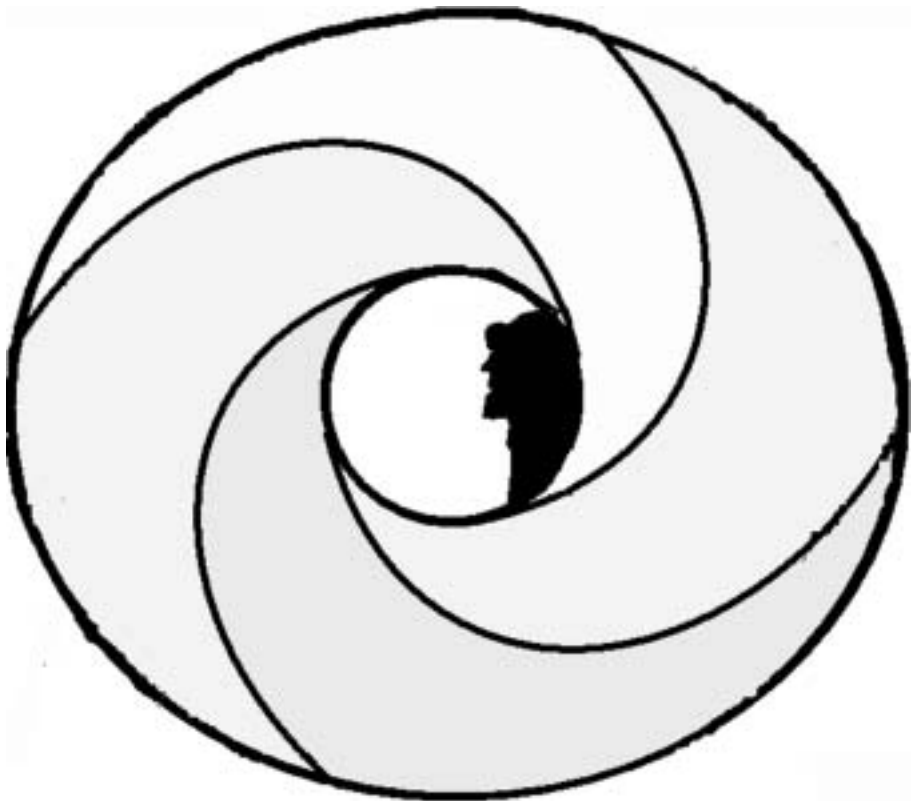

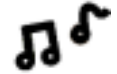

First time at an RG? **Claire Natola** is here to answer all our questions and to show you the ropes. Meet fellow newcomers and make some fast friends.



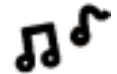

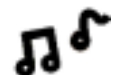

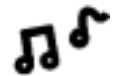

Wrought iron processes changed four times from antiquity to today, and real wrought iron is no longer made at all with a couple of exceptions. Cast iron processes improved but remained substantially unchanged from Roman times to today. Retired metallurgist **Jim Johnston** explains how New England was once the leader in iron production but as processes and ore sources changed, the industry's locales changed and finally left New England entirely.

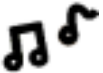
Don't Save the Planet!, Brookfield

Doug Wheeler provides an abbreviated answer to several important questions: What are the historical origins of novelist Ian Fleming's James Bond novels as well as the James Bond films? What is the significance of 'the James Bond phenomenon or 007' in terms of the popular culture of entertainment, spy fiction, and the culture and cult of secret activities? The setting for Fleming's first Bond novel, *Casino Royale*, will be examined to provide an insight into the relation between History and Fiction, between World War II secret intelligence and Cold War secret wars. How has a sense of British national pride and place been affected by the Bond creation and how has the Bond story become, in effect, globalized for mass audiences from Peoria to Pakistan?

Mensan panelists **Bev Bryant, John Richards, and Bette Lewicke**, all insiders in the neurorehabilitation community, will discuss what it is like to have a brain injury and how it affects putting one's life together afterwards. Topics that will be covered include brain injury statistics, applying creativity and intelligence toward identifying

employment opportunities, cognitive-emotional assessment and brain organization, and resources for making the journey back. Although the discussion will center on brain injury, the principles that will be discussed can be applied by others who have experienced other types of physical or psychological challenges.

3:30-4:30 p.m. Artemesia and Susanna and the Elders, Brookfield Artists Artemesia and Orazio Gentilischi (daughter and father) were followers of Caravaggio. Artemesia was part of a rape trial that her father brought against one of his students. She was tortured to obtain the truth and still lost. Much controversy has surrounded her painting *Susanna and the Elders*, mainly because art historians say she could not have executed such a technical feat at the age of thirteen. Many historians have tried to credit her father with this work. **Carmelina Fauteaux** will examine why that is not possible, comparing Artemesia's version with many examples of the popular *Susanna and the Elders* theme by other famous painters.

Sudoku Tournament - Opening Round, Tournament Room

Sudoku, a logic-based placement puzzle, is named after the Japanese phrase "suji wa dokushin ni kagiru" ("the digits must remain single"). Each puzzle is a 9x9 grid made up of nine 3x3 subgrids, starting with various single digits given in some cells. The goal is to finish filling out the 9x9 grid such that:



- each column has each of the first nine single-digit numbers (with no repeats)
- each row has each of the first nine single-digit numbers (with no repeats)
- each 3x3 grid has each of the first nine single-digit numbers (with no repeats)

The attraction of the puzzle is that the completion rules are simple, yet the line of reasoning required to reach the completion may be complex. Educators recommend the game as an exercise in logical reasoning. Before the tournament starts, a warm-up puzzle will be administered; whoever finishes fastest with the correct solution in either contest will receive a door prize. The tournament consists of three puzzles; the fastest three people with the correct solution will advance to the finals, which will occur at 6:00 p.m.
