9:00 a.m. **Education in Exile: Teaching in a Tibetan Refugee Community in the Himalayas - Carolyn White, Hollis**

When His Holiness the Dalai Lama of Tibet was forced to flee his homeland in 1959, he settled in Dharamsala, a hill station in the Himalayan foothills of northern India. Dharamsala is now the center of a vibrant Tibetan refugee community: it is the seat of the Tibetan Government-in-Exile and home to thousands of Tibetans who have escaped political and religious oppression in their homeland and followed their leader into exile. It is also a backpacker's paradise, with tourists from around the world—drawn to the town's mountainous landscape and promise of spiritual awakening—mixing with the Tibetan and Indian residents in a true cultural *mélange*. In 2007, Professor White spent her six-month sabbatical living and working in Dharamsala, where she taught English to Tibetan refugees and experienced firsthand the beauty of their ancient, rich, and tragically threatened culture. Join Carolyn for a discussion of her adventures in India, where she braved monsoon downpours—and roaming livestock—to get to language class; learned about the rules of cricket from sports-crazy monks; studied Buddhist philosophy with a respected lama; and discovered that ultimately her Tibetan students were the true teachers.

9:00 a.m. Formation of the Many Conspiracy Special Interest Group - Kevin Tremblay, Chesterfield



Kevin Tremblay, founder of the MC-SIG, is a Maine Mensa member from Ripley. From early childhood when his parents, relatives and neighbors (those he trusted) tried to fool him that there was a Santa Claus, he knew something was wrong in the universe. Why lie to give him presents? It did not make sense. That is a warping conspiracy. There are thousands more.

From Kris Kringle, to the third building collapsing at the World Trade Center on 9/11, there are conspiracies. Disinformation, misinformation, truth paired with lies; are techniques, and technologies exist, that are used to shape thinking and behavior. MCSIG proposes to explore these events, capabilities and investigate the world of “non-lethal weapons” to elicited meaning out of the chaos of conspiracy theories. The approach of our news sources that say: “we report, you decide,” is spin that is used to led mass thought to slanted views.

The areas suitable for this group’s discussion are: MK-Ultra, Remote Viewing and Stargate, L. Ron Hubbard, Nazism, Gang, Vigilante or Cause Stalking; Andrija Puharich, the False Memory Foundation, Reptilians, Aliens and Demons; Religions and Occult Sciences, Mind Control, Cybernetics, New World Order, Chemtrails, Illuminati, Secret Societies, Eugenics, and the Biodiversity Treaty and Declaration of Human Rights; are some of the subjects to discuss in the MC-SIG.

10:30 a.m. Cohousing: "Drawing on the strength of community to live sustainably" - Françoise Paradis, Meet & Greet

Cohousing visionary and project developer, Françoise Paradis, Ed.D., will give a presentation on the characteristics of cohousing and its many benefits - for the individual, the community and the environment. The concept originating in Denmark in the 1970's, is growing in popularity in this age of "Green" consciousness, and the desire of many for a greater sense of connection and community. Many cohousing communities are a mix of families, retirees and single individuals who share some time together at weekly community meals, engaging in common interests or just helping each other out by sharing errands, tending a garden, childcare, or pet sitting.

The number of cohousing communities in the United States is on the verge of doubling, with 111 cohousing communities nationwide, another 113 are currently in the process of development. One of those new projects, being developed by Dr. Paradis with support from members of the community, is Greensward Hamlet, located in Buxton, Maine.

Dr. Paradis is quick to point out, "These are not 'hippie communes', but an intentional way to live independently AND in community at the same." It is a well documented fact that people are happier, healthier, more productive, and live longer when they

are connected to a nurturing social network. In addition, Dr. Paradis promotes the sustainable use of geothermal, solar, and wind power for generating energy, greatly reducing the “carbon footprint”, energy consumption, and monthly utility bills.

Participants will learn the characteristics that make cohousing communities unique and timely in the 21st century.

11:00 a.m. View from the Top: Imaging the Earth's Environment from Space - David Bartlett, Hollis



The last 30 years have witnessed a revolution in the use of aerial and orbital sensors to image and study the Earth (AKA “remote sensing”). UNH’s Institute for the Study of Earth, Oceans, and Space (EOS) has been at the forefront of research developing and applying these techniques. In this presentation, examples of imagery and other data from remote sensors will be used to demonstrate applications under development at EOS. Sample imagery and research topics include assessment of forest health in the US and Europe; mapping migratory bird habitat in the White Mountains; measuring plant production in the oceans and on land; and, contributions to predicting bird flu outbreaks in Asia.

She uses her abilities in Ghost Quest to speak with the spirits in a home and help those same spirits cross over if they choose (and sometimes even if they don't). Beckah Boyd is also a Psychic Medium with over fifteen years practice and seven years professionally. She has worked with some of New Hampshire's top businesses as a consultant and reader at corporate events. She lends her abilities to validate spirit hauntings and give closure to families. She also uses her abilities to cleanse the home, help spirits cross over and find vortexes. Ghost Quest uses a mix of spirituality and hard evidence to validate the hauntings. Using the same tools that many other groups do, they go in with a skeptic's eye and are on a never ending quest to find out exactly what goes bump in the night.

Many Thanks to Our Speakers!

David Bartlett holds a Bachelor's degree in Geology from Amherst College and a doctorate in Marine Sciences from the University of Delaware. He spent ten years as a research scientist at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Langley Research Center, conducting studies of the environment using sensors on Earth-orbiting satellites. His research interests are in chemical interactions of vegetation with the atmosphere, causes and effects of global-scale climate change, and management of coastal resources. He has published extensively on the use of aerial and orbital sensors for measurement of important environmental parameters. Since 1989, Dr. Bartlett has been Associate Director of the Institute for the Study of Earth, Oceans, and Space (EOS) at the University of New Hampshire. He is responsible for the management of the Institute's research and educational programs and assists the Director in planning and in developing new avenues for external support of the Institute. EOS' research in space and Earth sciences is supported by more than \$30 million per year of grants and contracts. Dr. Bartlett is the founding Director of the New Hampshire Space Grant Consortium, an educational and public information collaboration of New Hampshire Universities, Colleges, and science organizations. Dr. Bartlett continues his research in applications of satellite sensors to assess large scale variation in environmental conditions and the impact of terrestrial ecosystems on

global biogeochemical cycles. He serves on the Policy Advisory Committee of the New Hampshire Sea Grant Program.

Chuck Bovaird started off as a financial advisor at MassMutual, and then later moved to Prudential. He primarily does retirement planning for his clients. He also works with small businesses.


